How to Vote in Our Board Election

Vote in Our Board Election!

Would you like to have a say in how Pierce Conservation District is run? Vote in our upcoming board election.

There are **two ways to participate** in the District Election.

1. **In person** - You may appear in person at the Pioneer Park Pavilion, 330 South Meridian in Puyallup, between 4 PM and 8 PM on March 15, 2023, and vote in person. You will be required to show identification to verify that you are a qualified voter.
2. **By mail** - [Request a ballot](#) by February 22nd at 4:30pm.
 - Ballots returned by mail must be post-marked no later than Election Day, March 15, 2023, and be received no later than March 22, 2023, in order to be counted. Ballots received after March 22, 2023 will not be counted.
 - Locked ballot box at PCD office -- Ballots returned by other means must be returned and placed in the locked ballot box at 308 West Stewart Avenue in Puyallup no later than 3 PM on Election Day, March 15, 2023.

Prior to participating you should:

1. Make sure you live within [PCD's boundaries](#)*
2. Check that your Pierce County voter registration has the same name and address you use to register to vote in PCD's election. If you aren't a Pierce County registered voter, [register to vote here!](#)

***What are the District's boundaries?** Unincorporated Pierce County, City of Bonney Lake, City of Buckley, City of Dupont, City of Fircrest, City of Gig Harbor, City of Lakewood, City of Milton, City of Orting, City of Puyallup, Town of Steilacoom, City of Sumner, City of Tacoma, and City of University Place.

Endangered Turtle Found at our Habitat Restoration Site



Have you ever heard of the [endangered Western Pond Turtle](#)? You probably haven't unless you have spent a lot of time around Oregon and California's ponds.

Believe it or not, this turtle was originally found all the way from [Baja California to Canada](#). But most importantly, these turtles **loved the wetlands here in the Puget Sound**. There was even a **population of our own living at our habitat restoration site, Deadman's Pond** (no other reason has been found to why it is called Deadman's Pond, other than the fact that it's close to a cemetery- but rest assured, it is a cool place). Several years ago, only one Western Pond Turtle was left there. That lonely guy was rehomed to the [Woodland Park Zoo](#) to participate in their [turtle recovery program](#).

Pierce Conservation District seeks a full-time [Senior Director of Finance and Administration](#). This is an administrative position of Pierce Conservation District. The employee occupying this position reports to the Executive Director and will work closely with the Board of Supervisors, all Program Directors and staff of the organization to support them in the delivery of our mission.

The ideal candidate will have strong working knowledge and experience in managing human resources and experience in supporting business and operation functions of a mid-sized organization. A keen understanding of budgets, finance, grants procurement, and program administration are an absolute requirement. A previous track record of successfully working with a board of directors and other elected and/or appointed officials is preferred and cultivating a team of professionals to excel in program delivery. Pierce Conservation District staff are represented by the Washington Federation of State Employees. This is a non-represented senior management position, and experience with unions and collective bargaining processes is desired. Starting Salary \$99,816, with competitive benefits. Position is "hybrid," with some remote work possible, but with onsite work at Puyallup office required. Position is open until filled, with a desired start date of **March 1, 2023**.

Grants for Farmers Available Through Tilth Alliance

[Tilth Alliance](#) is now accepting applications for the [Washington State Organic and Sustainable Farming Fund](#) (WSOSFF).

Applications are **due Feb. 19, 2023**.

This opportunity is available to **farmers seeking financial assistance to support projects that will improve the economic viability, social impacts, or environmental sustainability of their farm businesses and/or community**. The goal of these grants is to enhance the operations of farmers practicing responsible and progressive methods such as sustainable soil management, crop diversification, habitat preservation, climate change mitigation and environmentally safe waste management practices. Grant requests can be made **up to \$10,000**.

The grant program is open to all Washington State farmers who:

- Currently employ or are adopting practices that follow regenerative, sustainable, and/or organic principles (this includes conventional farms that are transitioning into organic, sustainable, or regenerative production).
- Have been in business for at least two years.
- Are seeking to improve and/or expand their operation, improve environmental impacts, or become a more sustainable business.
