March Last Month for Urban Tree Sale

January 17 - March 31

The [2023 Spring Urban Tree Sale](#) will close at the end of this month. We offer 11 different tree varieties for as low as \$10 per tree.

The sale is **limited to residents in the cities of Tacoma and Puyallup and Unincorporated Pierce County**. Customers can buy up to **three trees** each time PCD holds a sale for a total of up to 6 trees per property.

With the purchase of a tree, customers also receive a free educational workshop and a slow-release watering bucket.

Wildfire & Disaster Info Fair in Wilkeson




Interested in learning the basics of successful vegetable gardening in the PNW?

Save the Date: Starting Your Farm


May 6th, 10AM - 12PM

Help Us Celebrate Earth Day!



While Earth Day is still over a month away, we're **starting our celebration plans early**! A regular Earth Day activity is planting trees and flowers, which is always a great idea, but late April can be a challenging time for the plants.

Like a lot of us, most plants go dormant in the winter. As soon as spring comes, they start to "wake up," growing their roots, branches, leaves, and flowers. If you try transplanting

plants while they're growing, it can stress them out and reduce their chances of surviving. The best times for planting in your yard are late winter/early spring (just before the plants wake up) or early fall (after most plants have gone dormant but before continuous hard frosts).

So, instead of stressing out plants for Earth Day, we're encouraging folks to plant something NOW! That way, you can spend Earth Day enjoying new blooms and growth. To help get you started, PCD created four [do-it-yourself activity pages](#) for different [urban habitat projects](#). By following the step-by-step instructions, you can create your own patch of urban habitat without too much time or money. 
Wildlife of South Prairie Creek Preserve

How to Vote in Our Board Election

Vote in Our Board Election!

Would you like to have a say in how Pierce Conservation District is run? Vote in our upcoming board election.

There are **two ways to participate** in the District Election.

1. **In person** - You may appear [in person at the Pioneer Park Pavilion](#), 330 South Meridian in Puyallup, between 4 PM and 8 PM on March 15, 2023, and vote in person. You will be required to show identification to verify that you are a qualified voter.

2. **By mail** -

- Ballots returned **by mail** must be post-marked no later than **Election Day, March 15, 2023**, and be received no later than March 22, 2023, in order to be counted. Ballots received after March 22, 2023 will not be counted.

- Locked ballot box at PCD office** -- Ballots returned by other means must be returned and placed in the locked ballot box at 308 West Stewart Avenue in Puyallup no later than 3 PM on Election Day, March 15, 2023.

Prior to participating you should:

1. Make sure you live within [PCD's boundaries*](#)
2. Check that your Pierce County voter registration has the same name and address you use to register to vote in PCD's election. If you aren't a Pierce County registered voter, [register to vote here!](#)


***What are the District's boundaries?** Unincorporated Pierce County, City of Bonney Lake, City of Buckley, City of Dupont, City of Edgewood, City of Fircrest, City of Gig Harbor, City of Lakewood, City of Milton, City of Orting, City of Puyallup, Town of Steilacoom, City of Sumner, City of Tacoma, and City of University Place.

Free Forestry Workshop in Eatonville

Saturday, March 11th from 11 am - 3 pm

Eatonville, WA 98328



This free workshop is made possible with financial support from the USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture, Western Extension Risk Management Education. At this workshop in an Eatonville family forest, professional foresters will introduce forest owners to a set of simple, hands-on strategies for increasing their forests' resilience in the face of a warmer and drier climate.

The workshop will focus on forest thinning and other ecological forestry strategies for mitigating risk of fire, pests, disease, improving timber quality for family forest owners who harvest, and strengthening ecosystem services.

In late April, they also plan to host a chainsaw maintenance, safety, and tree felling class for forest owners in Eatonville.
